Through our network of heroes, HOPE Cape Town strives to improve the quality of life of families affected by HIV/AIDS and related illnesses across the Western Cape.

A brief history.

In 1999 Rev Fr Stefan Hippler joined Dr Monika Esser, Head of Immunology at Tygerberg Hospital, in investigating a solution for the treatment and care of HIV positive children. Their efforts lead to the launch of HOPE Cape Town as a registered non-profit and public benefit organisation in October 2001, and the establishment of the Ithemba ward at Tygerberg Children's Hospital - the first dedicated ward for the tertiary care of HIV positive children. Today, in partnership with other non-profit

organisations and local and international universities, HOPE Cape Town continues to provide education, treatment and support.



THERE'S HOPE 11 year old Teko was admitted to Tygerberg Children's Hospital with tuberculosis. Doctors diagnosed Teko as HIV positive and began antiretroviral treatment.

WHEN A LITTLE HERO NEEDS HELP,

Naturally, Teko's mum Susan wanted to remain with him throughout his treatment.

HOPE Cape Town provided the family with clothing, toiletries and support. As part of our HOPE to Home project Ayanda, a HOPE Community Health Worker, was assigned to stay in touch with the family once Teko left hospital, to make sure he took his medication as prescribed and to monitor his progress carefully.

How can you help: You can contribute towards HOPE to Home care and support packages valued at R3 000 per child per month.

Xolani, one of our 25 HOPE Community Health Workers, lives in a disadvantaged community and has an intimate understanding of the conditions in which many of

his patients live. During his 7 years with HOPE Cape Town, Xolani has been trained to counsel his little patients and their families. These are amongst Xolani's responsibilities: HIV and TB awareness, testing and counselling

Education on prevention, hygiene and antiretroviral treatment

- Assist with prevention of mother to child transmission
- and drug adherence Child care services including immunisation and nutrition
- Implementation of community development projects
